Women's Central League vs Valeron, Hutt Park

Coming into today's game against Valeron the ladies had three things they needed to focus on throughout the whole game. 1, Communication on and off the ball. 2, Keep the ball on the ground. 3, Keep the intensity up for whole 90 minutes.... and they managed to do just that.

Winning the kick-off we went straight onto attack and placed Valeron under pressure. The game was played at a fast pace going back and forward but it was the Stop Out ladies settling

first and taking control of the game. During the first half Ella Vincent-Hyde had several one on one opportunities with the Valeron keeper but simply could not finish but it was only going to a matter of when and not if, for the first goal to be scored.

Around the 30 minute mark we had Melanie Macdougall (Playing her 100th Game) wanting to be subbed off and Mike simply said 'NO' and moved her up into the attack position and brought Ella back into her role to cover until half time. This did the trick as in the 41st minute of the game Mel took on a couple of players and struck the ball with confidence and placed the ball in the back of the net to give the side a 1-0 lead heading into the half time break.

In the changing rooms the focus was around keeping to our 3 objectives and not letting our concentration slip. We decided that the formation would change from a 4-5-1 to a 4-4-2 for the rest of the game to apply even more pressure onto Valeron.

Second half started and Valeron Kick off. Didn't take long for the ladies to win back possession and then it was happy camping down in Valeron half. Valeron were able to counter attack on several occasions but it was our Captain Aimee Sanson and fellow centre back Kassandra Clendon making her Central League debut that had the back line covered all day and ensured that no shots would be allowed near our goal.

The demise of women's football at Lower Hutt City and the withdrawal of the Karori CL team shook up the local landscape. Aside from a huge amount of player movement there was the somewhat irregular promotion of teams to fill vacant Central and Premier League places. Here at Stop Out we were the beneficiary of those shenanigans, a good outcome but a challenging one all the same as we scrambled to field two competitive sides at the highest levels of local football.

Stellar work from the coaching/management team has seen the two teams' progress well, not always getting the results at this stage but certainly in good heart for the second half of the winter. There's a good mix of familiar faces across the two teams mingled with new recruits who are all bringing something to the table and the team lists of the past week or two look on paper immensely stronger than the lists of early April. The weekend before last the Premier team clipped the wings of the table topping Petone team in the first round of the Premier Cup, a team performance that augurs well for the 2nd round of competition. The team is in a dog fight with Karori and KCU and we're backing Phil and the girls to climb past these two.

The CL team caused a little bit of history last weekend. For those at Hutt Park on a beautiful afternoon the team put on a terrific team display in overwhelming the visiting Valeron team from Palmerston North. The team roster included debutants, Emily Yates and Kass Clendon, (Kass playing 90 at centre back and taking out the player of the day award). Also playing her first game for the team was the experienced Haley Pllu who is a welcome addition to the midfield. Don't be surprised if Mike adds a couple more players to the

FOOTBALL

STOP OUT easily saw off defending champions Miramar at Hutt Park on Saturday, beating them 3-0 in the latest round of Central League football.

Looking to build on last week's win over Wellington Olympic, Miramar did anything but. Things were looking grim after half an hour, when they lost defender Tim Schaeffers to a red card after receiving two cautions.

Stop Out made the numerical advantage count almost immediately when Micky Malivuk headed home after a poor clearance from goalkeeper Michael O'Keeffe.

Malivuk continued to create problems for the Miramar defence as he proved to be an effective target man with Miramar's outlet in Henry Fa'arodo well-isolated by the Stop Out defenders.

James Wypych put away Stop Out's second of the afternoon before putting the third goal on a plate for Michael Hagarty to bundle in at the back post later in the match. The win moves Stop Out comfortably to the middle of the table while Miramar remain on seven points at the bottom end of the table.

At the sharp end of things, Napier City Rovers maintained their position at the top of the table in beating Western Suburbs 5-1 at Park Island, yesterday.

Elsewhere, Petone managed to retain the O'Brien Shield in the local derby against Lower Hutt City at Petone Memorial Park. Petone struggled to gain the ascendancy but a great cross by George Mihe proved to be enough as Van Elia got onto the end of it to give the hosts a close 10 win.

Palmerston North Marist scored six of the best against Tawa in Palmerston North in a game that did nothing to ease Tawa's relegation worries.

In the late game, Wellington Olympic travelled to Masterton Memorial Turf to play Wairarapa United While Olympic managed to control large periods of the

game, it was Wairarapa who got the go-ahead goal after 40 minutes when a cross found Seule Soromon at the back post who finished with a tidy diving header to give the hosts the lead. That header proved to be the only goal of the match and enough to secure the three points, pushing Wairarapa up to second place.

Central League mid-season review

The conclusion of the Miramar game marked the halfway point in the season. Four wins and twelve points have put us comfortably in

mid-table. We have been competitive in all games this season; in our losses only top of the table Napier City Rovers has beaten us by more than a single goal (3-1 in the first round). We have had



changes in personnel at the club that was always going to take time to settle and more injuries than we would have expected, so with that in mind we should be comfortable with where we are...

The fantastic part of working with this group of coaches and players that is anyone asked someone in the group if they are content with where they are in the league they will get a resounding no as a response. The appetite to do well and exceed expectations runs right through this squad.

What we have done in the first half of this season is a good benchmark it's been about putting in solid performances week in week out. We have done that, although minor mistakes and short lapses of concentration at this level can punish. This is certainly a learning we have taken from our first 9 league games.

So onto the second round, we are playing better each week and we will look to really enforce ourselves onto the league. We will look to shock a few teams up the top and really assert ourselves on the teams around us. We have a tough start with Napier City Rovers at home to begin the round, but what better way to set a challenge than against the deserved league

leaders coming off an emphatic victory over Western Suburbs last time out.

It is an exciting time to be part of this club and I truly believe that we are heading in the right direction.

Look forward to seeing you all down at Hutt Park over the last 9 rounds.

Life-long Stop Out fan Mike Barton gives us his perspective on the beautiful game!



Barcelona and Ghana all get mentioned in the same football article. The last week has been, at the risk of getting carried away, a 'frenzy' of football activity. Men's Under 20 World Cup, Men's Central League, and, as I write, this morning's UEFA Champions League Final. One constant theme across the three competitions, for me, has been food. I am not one for food at matches as I usually get absorbed by the game and completely discount eating. It is not the priority, the match is. Ghana versus Argentina on Wednesday (3rd of June) was a great match. Not a good one but a great one. In my book one of the very best I have been to. If Godfred Donsah turns down Juventus we really should declare an interest. Most of the 5,542 that were there, at the final whistle seemed to believe that it was a great match. It was breathless. High skill, energy and drama. On the food side I was offered some fish and chips. Not as interesting as the match but not without its own drama. Opening those little tomato sauce sachets whilst trying to give players instructions is never easy. Then the chips were a bit cold. Fish wasn't.

Friday and we went to the match between New Zealand and Myanmar. At which I consumed more chips at one sitting than I have ever attempted before. They just kept arriving. First lot were near cold but later deliveries were hot and way too salty. The match itself kept us all focussed and wasn't until after than we all had raging thirsts. The stadium water fountain has never delivered so much to so few. The other major point was whether or not the Myanmar support 'out-supported' the New Zealand support.

Saturday, at Hutt Park, was left over day. The leftovers being two bars of chocolate mess, both of which are globally popular, that I had acquired on the way to the stadium. Each is possessed of more than enough sugar and several thousand (exaggeration) calories. Not that I ate much as watching us beat Miramar Rangers, so emphatically, was a buffet in itself. Way better than the sugary chocolate things. The question that arose was when was the last time we beat them at that level. (Where is a statistician when you need one?) It was a good win delivered, I thought, in some style.

Then on to the Champions League Final. I made the trek to *Chez Alastair* a fine little bistro on the Left Bank of the Waiwhetu Stream. These boutique eateries are in odd places. My expectation was a rooibos tea and some football. Instead it was *haricots cuits au four* with toasted grain bread, eggs and *saucisse végétarienne*. Then the football. It was hard to decide which was the sharper Barcelona's intent or the haircuts on display. Arturo Vidal's razor cuts were very good. Paul Pogba's highlight work would have taken an age.
