#### 2nd team update

Welcome to Hutt Park for the curtain raiser to the 1st team match today

which sees your home team Stop Out reserves vs Stokes Valley's first team in a top of the table clash for bragging rights in Cap 2. If you haven't been able to catch a Cap 2 game yet, or have yet to see the reserves play this season, you couldn't have picked a better match. You are in for a treat this game day!

Last weekend's round 7 match saw the reserves travel away to the unforgiving Richard Prouse Park to face another top of the table opponent in Wainuiomata. We knew this was going to a battle from start to finish, and after the weather that our region endured last week, we were expecting the worst from a pitch standpoint. We were pleasantly surprised to turn up and find a decent playing surface which would help our chances in the game.



We are starting to find a consistency in the personnel of this reserve group, which is beginning to translate into

how we look when we play, and ultimately turning into positive results and points on the table. We continue to field a starting back line with an average age of 18 years, and the boys played above and beyond their youth, showing composure on the ball, confidence in building out from our back and connecting the game moving forward. We limited the counter attack of Wainui to very few chances, and when called upon our GK Logan Van Der Vegt was outstanding, putting in a man-of-the-match performance with a few highlight reel and game changing saves.



Admittedly from the Wainui coaching staff in the postgame, we had the better of the game and the better of the chances around goal, and were unlucky not to have taken a few of our clear chances to be up 2 or 3 goals in the latter stages of the game. But the game of football goes that way sometimes, and as fate had it on the day, we gave up a penalty kick in the 80<sup>th</sup> minute to go down 1-0. However, the character, heart and determination that this group is starting to show duly rewarded us in the final minutes of the game. We went to 3 defenders at the back, pushing the towering Hayden "Stavros" Taylor forward (which we had

done earlier in the season just to see what the look would give us). Around the 85<sup>th</sup> minute, Alastair Hicks received a ball wide on the right side and floated it into the box which Stav was able to get his noggin' on the end of at the back post for a header to level us at 1-1.


