

The line up was Hill, Sutcliffe – Fairlie – Tai – Martens, Pickering – Gulley – Packer, Abba – Malivuk – Grindlay.

And in the 11 matches to date, 26 players have made an appearance for us in the Central League this season. It really reinforces the importance of a deep and high quality squad.



The Last Word!

What is coaching about?

My partner Kylie came home recently and presented me with an article on coaching. The title alone floored me. It reads ' A Bourdieusian analysis of cultural reproduction: socialisation and

the 'hidden curriculum' of professional football'. Once I got beyond the title there was a lot of material about what it is that coaching does. One thing that is advanced is the idea that coaching goes merely beyond trying to a get a team together to win matches. The authors argue that football has a 'legitimate' culture and aside from winning the other legitimacies that coaching passes on are respect for authority, hierarchical awareness, control, obedience, collectivity, and work ethic. The particular focus of their argument is that this is what is happening with younger players. That is coaches are introducing them both to the game and, at the same time, the game's culture.

Further the contention is that coaching is simply a function and ignores the fact that it, coaching, reproduces and perpetuates the the social structure of the game.

That last point is, I believe, interesting in that growing up inside a football family it might be easy enough to have absorbed the culture of the game from a very young age but what of those from non football backgrounds where do they learn the 'rules' of the football culture? The argument is that the learning comes down from coaches and that coaching is an 'ideology'. Many of us take for granted and see as natural a lot of the values and beliefs in football. I can highlight this with an anecdote that is not a coaching argument but bear with me. When LA Galaxy played in Wellington a few years back one of their players, David Beckham, was booed onto the pitch. At the post match press conference a spluttering non football journalist asked him what he thought of being booed. Beckham seemed puzzled by the question and then answered 'as soon I as I heard it I knew this was a football crowd'. That the booing of a player can be both criticism and praise, albeit veiled, at the same time is not always apparent to a football outsider.

The article also talks of the 'apprenticeship' that coaches go through in order to learn to coach. It was here that I thought of coaching courses and seminars but no. The apprenticeship is both long and questioning. It includes observing and receiving coaching as players, then being novice and assistant coaches, and finally doing the job on your own. Even if you coach as a twenty year old you may already have served as much as fifteen years of an apprenticeship.

There is much more in the article than I can condense here. I was left with the feeling that coaching is a challenge and a learning experience. A challenge in which knowledge is both passed on and perpetuated. The knowled+ge not just of the game in itself but also the culture of the game
