Another pleasing outcome of our focus in the important space between junior and senior football has already seen the success of our new U17 programme. With over 40 young players our 17B's are unbeaten after two rounds and our 17C's recorded their first win last week. Just as important is the culture already instilled in the group with head coach Alistair Yates and Assistant Kieran Mouton developing a very strong club ethos with these lads; and supported in the U17c's by Mack Mullany and Liam Reeve plus Adam Reynard who is overseeing the whole U17 programme. There is confidence that we will see most of these players move into Senior football in the very near future with many already earmarked for first team football.

But we're not forgetting our social players. The club worked with Downers and Hutt City Council pre-season to create a couple of new fields on our training areas for use in the early part of the season. We have been somewhat aggrieved over the years with Stop Out teams being scheduled away from Hutt Park with an almost one game per day, or worse one game per weekend philosophy. These new fields not only allow more matches and more Stop Out teams to play at Hutt Park but allows us to work with the authorities to spread the ground usage and protect our fields when the weather does turn bad in the winter months. The success of this initiative came to fruition last weekend with four fields in action and the clubroom buzzing at the after match.

And one other phenomenal result last weekend saw Masters McCreadies score their customary "one win per season". Not sure what they have left to play for in 2016!

# Stop Out win local derby to make it two from two in the men's Central League

Stop Out are the only team with a perfect record through the first two rounds of the Central League after a local derby win over Petone.

Petone had home ground advantage at Petone Memorial Park on Saturday, but were on the wrong side of a 5-1 defeat. Goals from Stop Out's Micky Malivuk and Andrew Abba saw their side quickly take control of the game. Petone had few chances on goal, but a strong strike from Ben Feld was pushed wide by Stop Out's keeper in the first half. A second to Abba, and a well-timed chip over the head of Petone keeper Jake Piper had Stop Out heading to the break 4-0 up.

Petone showed a stronger defensive effort in the second half, which was marred by a number of yellow cards to both teams and the sending off of Jordan Pickering. A goal to either side in the second half had the game finish up 5-1 to Stop Out, who now top the table with maximum points from the first two rounds.



## Women's Central League Update

Two weeks into the 2016 football season and the Stop Out Women's Central League side has a new look about them. Not only have we had to rebuild with seven new players coming into the squad and change the way that we approach each game, the side is all a buzz as they kicked off their season in style with WINS over two Palmerston North teams.

### Week one vs Valeron at Skoglund Park in Palmerston North.

We travelled north with the team focussed on coming away with early season points. The match started and it was the opposite to what we had wanted with Valeron playing the better football and causing our players to panic. It took 15 minutes for us to find our feet on what can only be described as a short, narrow, bumpy un-mowed pitched with burnt in line markings. In the 25<sup>th</sup> minute a ball was played in from the right hand side and a big scramble appeared in the six yard box where Emily Jones having her debut for the club got a foot to the ball and score the opening much needed goal to get the ball rolling. Nine minutes later and another ball played from the right into the six yard box for Emily Jones to attack from the left hand side and place the ball in the back of the net. 2-0 up and the ladies finally switched on and began to play football with a self-belief that they could really take control of the game and put it beyond doubt.

2-0 at half time and in the changing rooms we talked about stepping it up from the kick off and really hammering home the advantage. That's exactly what happened. From the kick off we sent a lovely ball over the defence turning them around and regaining possession. A free kick in the 46<sup>th</sup> minute and Bex Williams decided to take on the keeper from 25 yards out, and she delivered scoring her first goal of the season and also creating that important 3-0 buffer. We were not done with there and 2mins later after some lovely passing through the middle of the field and then inside the 18 yard box saw a Laura Dobie strike on goal beat the keeper and make it 4-0 and the belief that Valeron were in for a long day.

That was not the case though as Valeron came back the stronger of the teams and scored two long range goals that caught our keeper off her line to make the last 18 minutes anyone's game. 74<sup>th</sup> minute into the game saw a lovely ball played over to the right hand side and then another cross played back into the 18 yard box catching the defenders off guard which saw Radha McGlashan running onto the ball hitting it first time and sending it sailing into the back of the net. 5-2 and that's where it finished.

### Week two vs Massey at Hutt Park.

After a solid week's training and asking the girls to all step up another 2% each we knew that our first game at home was very important to start on a positive note. Massey a team that is rebuilding themselves came out the stronger in the first 10 minutes but from then onwards the Stop Out Ladies gained control of the game.

In the 17<sup>th</sup> minute a ball was played back to Bex Williams in central defence who with a well struck first time hit from 40 yards out sent the ball sailing over the keepers head into the back of the net. Now full of confidence we managed to keep the ball in the Massey half and apply pressure without being able to finish off when it mattered most.

After some positive play and settling our frustration with the ball not hitting the back of the net one we managed to gain control through midfielder Emerald McGlashan who is also new to the club. Emerald managed to use her pace to beat the defence and score in the left hand corner of the goal and with it her first goal of the season and bring the game to 2-0.

Again with lots of possession and the clock running down to half time Emerald managed to intercept a pass beat the left hand defender and cut inside towards goal. Instead of taking the option of cutting the ball back for our awaiting strikers Emerald took on the keeper hitting the ball, cannoning off the left hand upright with the ball ending up across the other side of goal and in the back of net. So we went in with a 3-0 half time lead.

Again at half time we talked about not lowering the tempo of the game and to press forward to put the game out of reach and to keep our first clean sheet of the season. More attacks and more frustration came before some lovely play through the middle of the park saw an attacking Laura Dobie who was celebrating her birthday, calmly slot the ball in the back of the net to make it 4-0.

The side is now starting to build confidence and over the first two games of the season have scored more goals than we did in the entire first round of 2015, which shows we are finally putting our chances away in the final third. This weekend we travel back up to Palmerston North to take on newly promoted Marist who started their campaign with a 2-1 loss to Upper Hutt and a win against Valeron 4-0. The ladies know that they have to lift their game another 5% each in order to be competitive and to keep alive chances of being top of table after the third round.


### A long time between drinks

## The Last Word!

### The season so far...

Third match of the season already. How did that happen?

Now that we have so much social media around us it's great checking out other people's views of matches so far.

The interesting thing is that so many people are just plain wrong. Let us be clear about one thing. Wrong in social media terms means that the point of view expressed does not match your own. Once you find a comment that is different to your own it is important to let whoever made the comment know, as quickly and intemperately as is possible, that they are WRONG. Is it really that way or merely seems that way?

Twitter users for the most part have been pretty measured about the way the Men's Central League (#MCL16) season has been going so far. There are actually and, I believe, disproportionately less tweets about the Women's Central League (#WCL16). Why should that be? More research needed I guess. One thing to note is that Twitter only lets a user post 140 characters at a time. So, perhaps William Shakespeare foresaw Twitter when he wrote "brevity is the soul of wit".



Other social media platforms don't place the same restriction on the length of each post. These are the spaces where the 'more critical' come out of the woodwork. Critical they are. After the good win at Petone last week one critic commented 'If this was a top grade game its a poor reflection on the state of Wellington football'. Pah! My immediate response was to think how I could belittle the poster as well as their criticism. Imagine how football on the internet would be if we indulged in reasonable and rational discussion. That just wouldn't do. Anyway, I decided as a grown up user I would take a few seconds and consider whether there was any need, whatsoever, for me to reply a complete stranger's, clearly wrong, comment. I didn't reply. Someone else bravely did. The problem is that the reply was, sort of, factually wrong... so I had to correct them. Accuracy is important.

All that aside, the thing that is so very good about all the platforms in social media is they allow for immediate contact and surprisingly distant contact.
