# English Premier League players warned to behave around referees, or be shown cards

A crackdown on behaviour will kick in when the new season starts with referees instructed to show yellow and red cards to unruly players, the English Premier League has said. The unifying sight of snarling players berating officials over decisions or hurling abuse has been the scourge of the game. The Premier League, English Football League and Football Association have all clearly had enough.

In a joint directive, the three organisations said disrespect towards match officials had to stop. "We and our clubs have been discussing for some time concerns that certain elements of player behaviour are overstepping the mark - the mass confrontations, overt displays of dissent and offensive language," Richard Scudamore, the EPL's executive chairman said on Wednesday. "We are viewed by millions week in, week out - including lots of young people - and it is our collective position that these types of behaviour should no longer be tolerated."



The Professional Game Match Officials (PGMO) have been told to apply the laws of the game on dissent more vigorously. Insulting or abusive language or gestures towards match officials will result in a straight red card next season, as will aggressive physical contact. Yellow cards will be shown for a variety of disrespectful

behaviour, including responding aggressively to a decision or running towards an official to contest a call.

Mass surroundings of referees will also be punished with bookings to at least one of the players. The behaviour of coaches and technical staff will also be more strictly controlled.

"Things happen in the heat of the moment during fast and highly competitive football," Scudamore added. "We still want to see the passion fans enjoy and demand, but players and managers have to be aware there are lines that should not be crossed."

Football League chief executive Richard Harvey said the new directives were not just an idle threat.

"To be clear, this is a set of instructions from the football authorities to referees to take action against certain behaviour that we will not tolerate in our matches," he said.

In the Premier League, West Bromwich Albion were the worst offenders last season with 11 yellow cards shown.

Perhaps this initiative should be instigated here.

Then there can be no confusion for players & coaches as to their limits, and referee's will have the mandate to deliver consistent rulings.

## The Last Word!

### In the blink of an eye!

One audible factor at Men's Central League matches is the click and whirr of cameras. We have been blessed this season with the efforts of several people. If you follow the club Facebook page you will have seen the photographic work of them. They are six I will mention here Cameron 'PhotoMac' McIntosh, Mike Moran, Mike Sullivan, Dave 'Journey Fan' Webster, Michael 'Dr yomcat' Welsh and not so regularly NZLenz. They have produced some great records of the matches. Ansel Adams the great American photographer said 'There are no rules for good photographs there are only good photographs' and much, I argue, of what we have seen of late has backed that up.

The six mentioned are not simply getting lucky shots either. In answer to the question 'how many pics a match do you take?' these answers were given. Cameron – Central League about 400 to 500 and Phoenix about a 1000. Mike Moran – Stop Out from 50 to 100 and Phoenix 200 to 300. Mike Sullivan – 70 to 80 but peaked at 200 for one match. Dr yomcat - I normally do around 700 to 1000. (I know he did 742 at the Wellington United (Men) and 787 (Women) matches against Stop Out. ). Dave - 'usually anything between 4-800'. NZLenz - 'normally 500. Bursts bump up numbers of frames taken'.

It is not a case of simply firing of bursts and hoping. It is case of getting things right. Cameron and Mike Moran were alongside me at the match last season and the chatter between the two of the was great. Mostly like this. Did you get it? Yes. If the answer was 'nah' then some technical jargon would be exchanged and then a certain hush. Pretty sure that was concentration. Light is, stating the obvious, a big factor. From memory Cameron only took about thirty during the wet and windy match against Western Suburbs and Dave Webster left the camera in the car. One, and the main reason, was because the light was off and, two, in Dave's case because of the wet and the fact that his camera cost more than his car.

Two other things I have noticed are positioning and anticipation. Mike Moran, at one match, had his camera pointed in the opposite direction to the others. He was wanting a shot of the goalkeeper's reaction to play at the other end. He got it. Mike Sullivan seems to me to prefer one end of the ground and his reward was the fine photo of the winner against Miramar Rangers.

Two thoughts from Henri Carter-Bresson, the French photographer, for me, sum it up. Even though he was not a sports photographer. Firstly, 'your first 10,000 photographs are your worst'. Secondly, 'think about the photo before and after, never during. The secret is to take your time. You mustn't go too fast. The subject must forget about you. Then, however, you must be very quick'. ( p.s. yomcat is spelled with a lower case y. It's a Facebook thing.)
