







YOUTH FOCUS MOOTED FOR TOP TIER FOOTBALL COMPETITION

A premiership coach thinks one of the country's leading club football competitions could be doing more to develop young players.

In his first season as East Coast Bays premier team coach, David Mulligan sees an opportunity to get more teenagers playing in the Northern Region Football League.

Mulligan's motion for change may take time, but he is trying to make headway at his new club.

"We really want to try and encourage the younger players to put their hands up and really push to be in the first team," Mulligan said.

David Mulligan began his senior playing career at Central United before heading overseas.

Mulligan, a former All White, thinks the NRFL should be where younger school-age players get a chance to test themselves.

"Some coaches think 16 to 18 year olds are too young to play in the league and that those players should wait another two years until they can play in first teams," Mulligan said.

"If a player is 16 to 18 years old he should be in the first team reserves and knocking on the door to be a part of the first team; and this is the coaching style that I promote."

Actively participating with adult players who are more skilled, is the kind of challenge that some under-19 players need, Mulligan said.

"This will be the only way to improve a young player's skill level."

Mulligan began his own senior football career at Central United, as a teenager, alongside some iconic names in New Zealand football. At the time he was playing and training with the likes of Mark Elrick, Fred De Jong, Noah Hickey and Ivan Vicelich.

"I went on to play for the first team at 15 years old and this was an opportunity to improve my own

skill level, as a result of this I was then afforded the opportunity to move to the UK to start my professional career in football."

Mulligan believes the current set-up of the NRFL could be changed to help nurture the up and coming talent.

"I think it might be an idea to introduce a rule to the league that encourages coaches to have a first team Saturday squad made up of younger and older players. For example in a squad of 16 players a coach would have to have six players under the age of 20."

Mulligan has been around the league for a number of seasons, having most recently been a player/coach at Forrest Hill Milford.

THE ABSURDITY OF GOALKEEPING

Albert Camus was both a goal keeper and a philosopher. Certainly more famous for the latter. It was he, Camus, who once said that “After many years in which the world has afforded me many experiences, what I know most surely in the long run about morality and obligations, I owe to football.” Camus played as a goalkeeper.

This is, arguably, a position defined both by solitude and solidarity. It is the position where some of the most eccentric, outlandish characters of the sport have also flourished throughout history. The position for outsiders. As Jim White in London’s Daily Telegraph wrote “it, being in goal, is a lonely calling, an individual isolated within a team ethic, one who plays to different constraints. If his team scores, the keeper knows it is nothing to do with him. If the opposition score, however, it is all his fault”.

Whilst standing as a ‘sentinel in goal’ a goalkeeper has plenty of time to reflect on the absurdist nature of his position. In philosophy, “the Absurd” refers to the conflict between the human tendency to seek inherent value and meaning in life and the human inability to find any. In football the goalkeeper has the inherently absurdist role. This is a sport where the use of the foot is all and, yet, the goalkeeper alone relinquishes the use of the foot for the use of the hand. This is a sport where movement is all and yet one player, the goal keeper, sets aside movement for the loneliness of guarding the net. A static observer of all that is in front of them. That relative stasis that does not last.


To borrow from Søren Kierkegaard, the Danish philosopher. Each individual, not society or religion, is solely responsible for giving meaning to life and living it passionately and sincerely, or “authentically”. The goalkeeper’s burst of action, of participation, given meaning to the role and its authenticity. Without behaving authentically the role is absurd. The notion of the Absurd containing the idea that there is no meaning in the world beyond what meaning we give it. The goalkeeper, alone and from within, gives meaning to the role.

What of the broader game? French Football Weekly contend that Camus’s reasoning “was most

likely to be that in football, by essence, rules are clearly set out and easily understandable”. It is this simplicity that leads some to view football as a low-ranking sport for the masses. However it is also what makes it one of the most popular on our planet. They also further contend that “far from politicians trying to confuse us with their convoluted moral systems”, where words are kept one day and forgotten the next, “football is disarmingly disciplined”. The field is one and the same for everyone, the ball is one and the same, and what differentiates players is hard work and raw talent”.

If everything was as simple in our absurd society. If only we saw the world through goalkeepers’ eyes.
