



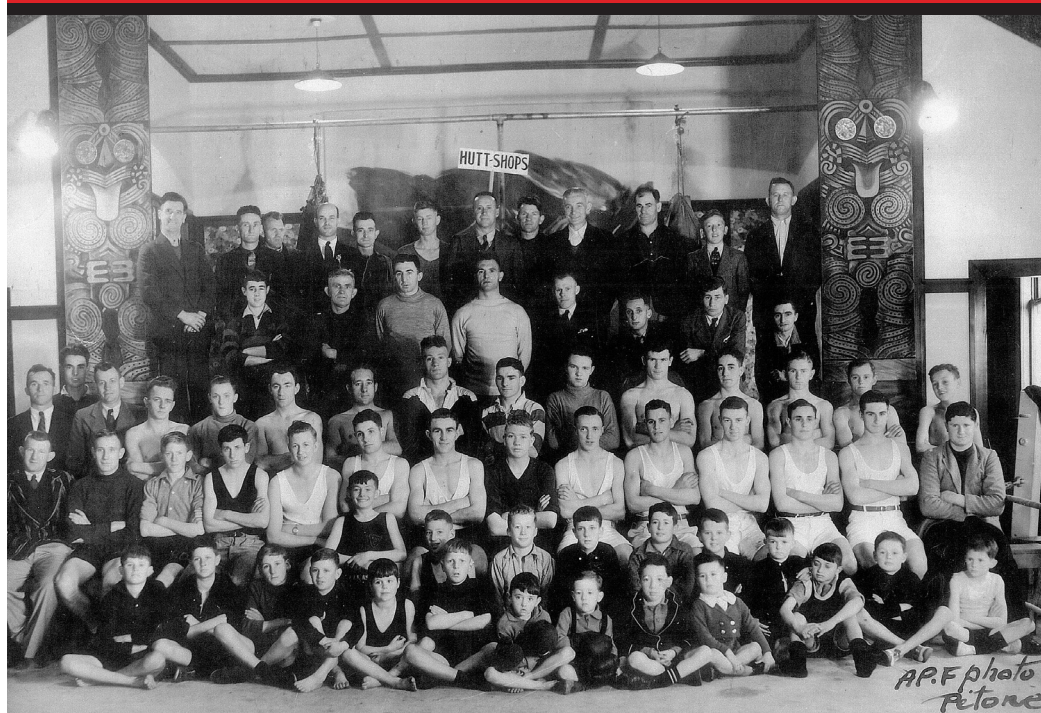

Stop Out v Napier City Rovers - Hutt Park

We welcomed Bill Robertson and his Napier City Rovers side to Hutt Park, looking to bounce back from a disappointing result against Miramar Rangers the previous week. A few injuries and absentees meant that we were a few numbers down but the strength of the squad was evident with a very strong matchday 14 being selected.

The first half was well contested, we lined up in a new system and whilst we kept possession well at times and defended strongly we didn't carry enough of a threat especially on the counter attack.

There were a few half chances either way but the most important moment was after 25 minutes when a small grab of the shoulder in the box was awarded as a penalty and Napier converted to give them a 1-0 lead that they took into the break.

During the halftime break we changed shape and had the confidence that we could pull the game back and take the points. We started the second half well and dominated possession and the flow of the game. We were rewarded on the hour mark when Micky smashed a header home from a Levi McFarlane cross. Within five minutes we were ahead as we were awarded a penalty which Steve Guley converted. From here I felt we were

comfortable in the game and was confident we could close out the result. Unfortunately it is not always that straight forward and with 10 to go Napier were fortunate to score direct from a free kick to level it up at 2-2.

At this point we could have gone one of two ways, let our frustration get to us and draw or even lose the game or shake it off and fight our way back in front. The lads showed great character and worked harder and harder to win the ball and get the ball into dangerous areas. From a wide free-kick with just 5 minutes to go Scott Henderson headed home his first goal since returning to the club to give us the lead. The remaining few minutes we defended our hearts out to secure 3 more big points at home.

All is all a tough but happy days work. Onto Wellington Olympic next week.

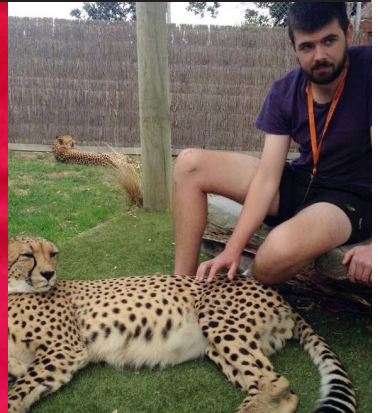

ROVERS PAY PRICE FOR UNTIDY SECOND-HALF STINT AGAINST STOP OUT

A sloppy 20-minute, second-half spell was the difference in Napier City's Rovers' defeat at the hands of Stop Out.

"It allowed them to get back in the game so we're really disappointed we haven't won the game, really," lamented coach Bill Robertson after the table-topping hosts pipped the Conroy Removals-sponsored Blues 3-2 in the Lotto Central League affair at Hutt Valley on Saturday.

Robertson said at halftime his troops were in control of the game with a 1-0 lead.

"We were looking to be at least two or three up at halftime," he said of the chances they had created but not sealed.

Striker Angus Kilkolly scored both Rovers' goals. He opened the scoring and when Micky Malivuk and a Steve Gulley penalty had put Stop Out 2-1 up, Kilkolly netted the equaliser before Scott Henderson nailed the home side's winner.

Robertson said from where he was positioned, the penalty looked weak but the ref saw it otherwise, pinging defender Charlie Yexley.

Two Canadians, Oliver Coren and Jean-Michel Paulin, were in the Rovers' mix but Englishman Fahad Rwakarambwe was out injured. Defender Blake Koolen was dropped to the reserves.

The Fergus Neil-captained Rovers have dropped to the second last rung of the table with just one victory, a draw and four losses - three on the trot.

Robertson reiterated the need for fans to manage their expectations.

"I'm not concerned. I don't think we're going to be in the relegation side," he said, emphasising their defeats, bar the 6-2 one to Wellington United here, were narrow.

WHAT IS LUCK?

Luck and lucky were two words that seemed to surround the conversations about the men's first team loss to Miramar Rangers. Voices from both Miramar and Stop Out both echoed the thought of how was it Stop Out took nothing away from the match. To quote from our last programme 'we created multiple chances and hit the post no less than six times'. One factor might just be luck.

One definition of luck is 'success or failure apparently brought by chance rather than through one's own actions' and another is 'the accidental way things happen without being planned'. And even luck is 'the events or circumstances that operate for or against an individual'.

The other aspect is the thought of unluck and that is said to be 'having, bringing, or resulting from bad luck'.

The Mens' Central League is reasonably tight and I guess on occasion you might only get six shots at goal in an entire match. The thought of having enough chances that the 'woodwork' struck six times is, again borrowing from the last programme, up in the 'struggling to make sense of' realm.

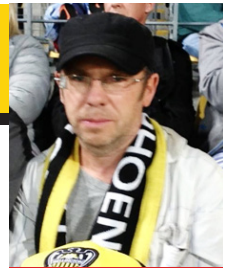
In a study in the USA participants were given a sports task to perform. At completion subjects were asked to attribute the cause of their increased or decreased performance to ability, effort, task difficulty and/or luck. The results indicated that successful outcomes were attributed to both ability and effort and that unsuccessful outcomes were attributed to a lack of ability but not a lack of effort.

Against Miramar there no lack of effort and no lack of ability but we still had an unsuccessful outcome. Surely, then, we can think of ourselves in that instance as being unlucky.

The idea of luck in sport may also just be the first response to a casual glance. In the eighties I watched a match, in England, where one team completely dominated the match only to lose by a single goal. Much of the news media coverage said that the winning side were lucky to win. Looking at the match again, and again, I could see

that the win was achieved by great tactical nous. The winning side boasted a great goal keeper and a tremendous back four. The losing side were very physical and in the previous encounter, between the two, had dominated the midfield due to that fact. So the winning manager had his team sit back and let the other side come at them. His keep had made several great saves but no more than he had done in the previous couple of matches. At first glance they won because of their keeper and the other side not taking chances and not using possession. Second glance reveals purpose and tactics.

The Miramar match was an illustration of the way luck runs, of being unlucky, and also that football can at times be an imperfect human endeavour where a centimetre here or a centimetre there can make quite a difference.
