



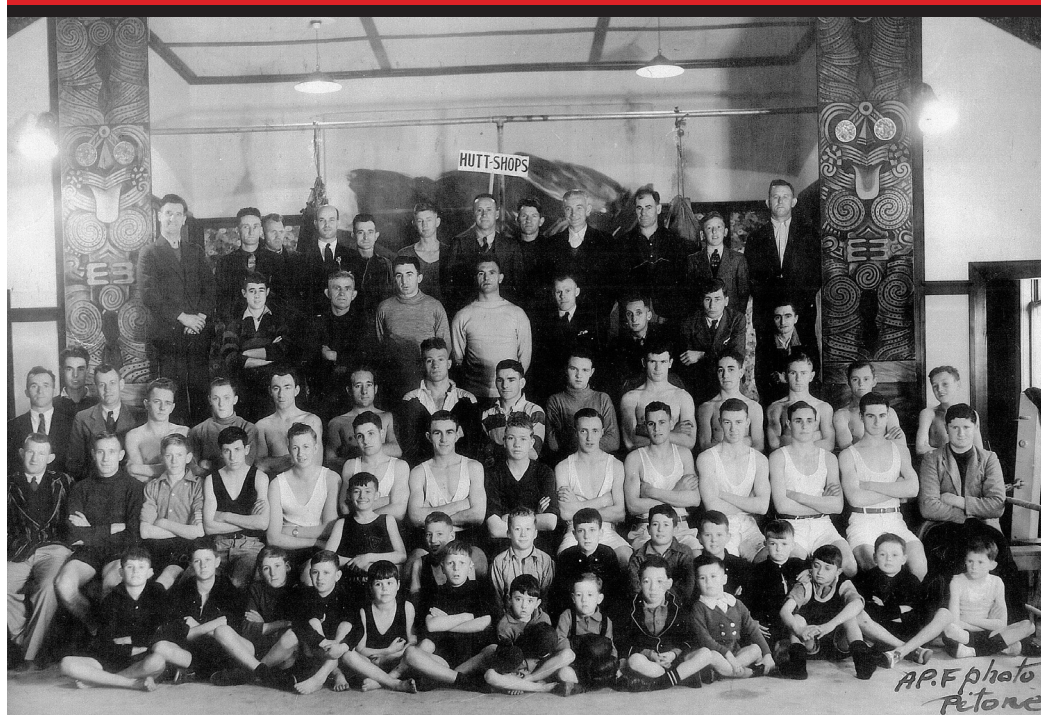

A curious decision was to allow PN Marist - in effect a representative team - into the league even though they aren't part of the Capital Football region.

So a six team league was confirmed with no changes to that league until 2019 - in essence no

promotion or relegation.

There were howls of criticism from the "experts" on social media. These keyboard warriors always seem to know best!

Early results didn't go our way but the heads never dropped. Culture and camaraderie are strong and there has been a massive improvement in results. That culminated in our first ever win against traditional powerhouse Seatoun.

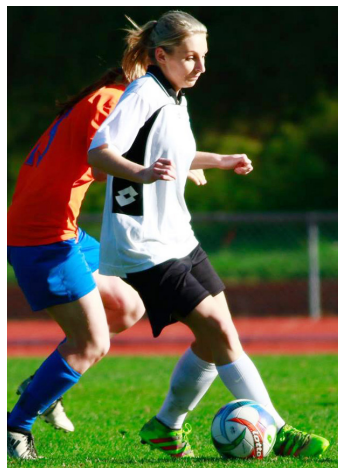

Congrats Mel Macdougall on playing 150 first team games and scoring 75 goals. A massive achievement for a midfielder, which also includes 6 hat tricks





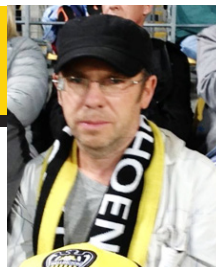
# POLY'S BACK

# THE LAST WORD

The Wellington newspaper The Dominion Post has been running a series of articles under the title Football Development Project. The series looked at the academies in that are available and the way, more broadly, football talent is nurtured and developed in this country. Whilst reading it I spluttered and moaned before I finally got down to actually reading and considering what was being presented. It was not time wasted.

At the end of it I was left with a real struggle on what was a better model, the pay to play academies or the grassroots club model? This is where, for me, the difficulty starts. Hand on heart, I love the club structure. Particularly the clubs that are cemented in community. In my own case I have a link to Stop Out going back to 1970 when I played my first games for the club. Back then we lived local and played local. It was a lot of fun interrupted only by schools wanting our playing services and, way back then, not being able to deliver in terms of, shall we say, infrastructure. Clubs created loyalties that schools did not. Sorry, that is getting off the point.

When we started with our clubs there was a clear 'development path'. That is, if you stayed at the club you knew that if you were good enough the National League beckoned. That was the top tier of the club's structure. If you weren't that good there would be other teams that you could slot into.

Granted there is an emotional and romantic notion to my view.

In the 21st Century we have academies out there and I confess to being torn over their place,

worth and value. Academies cost money to be part of and clearly if your parents don't have funds then you don't get to go. It is possible to imagine creating a silo full of middle class players. Notwithstanding that some academies do offer scholarships. Further, where academies recruit within a specific local catchment what sort of impact does that have on football within that catchment? What then makes the local clubs attractive for the better player? More and more, I believe, clubs then have to have the point of difference that attracts young people and makes them want to be part of something.

Academies also offer lots of time with coaches. One in the region offers football 4-6 days per week. Remembering the '10,000 Hour Rule', the much touted idea that suggests practising any skill for 10,000 hours is sufficient to achieve mastery, academies may hone talents a lot faster than clubs can. That said, once your time at an academy is over where are you going to head to? For the golden few it will be off to exciting pastures but the majority will find their way back into the grass roots club model. I am left with the one question. How do we create a balance between club and academy that benefits the whole of our game?
