With an 18 game season a slow start can have your season effectively over at this stage of the competition.

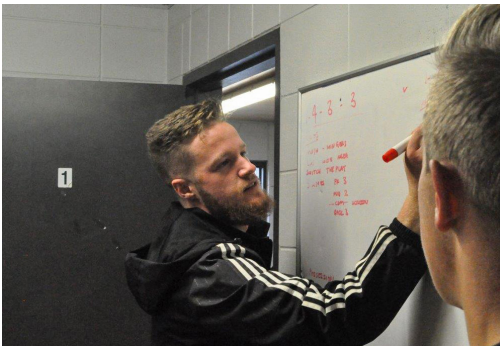

# STOP OUT 2018 MEN'S 1ST TEAM

## Stop Out vs Wellington Olympic - WAKEFIELD PARK

Conditions were great for our fixture against Olympic at Wakefield Park tonight. There was little to no wind and a slight touch of rain around to help the ball slide across the pitch nicely. We were coming off a frustrating defeat at home and were determined to finish this tough week of 3 games with a win and a good performance. Micky Malivuk returned from injury, Luis Corrales made his return to Stop Out and Amitesh Lal started in place of the suspended Jordan Martens.

A frantic start to this game by both teams set a high tempo early to this game. We struggled early to stop Olympics play out but were also managing to create some early pressure through a couple of quick counter attacks. Both sides were getting the ball in and around the danger area early and it was a matter of time before a goal came to break the game open. It was Olympic who got a good strike away from just outside the area, with the ball coming firmly off the crossbar. The ball fell to the feet of an Olympic attacker who made no mistake with a crisp first-time finish past McPeake and into our net for an early 1-0 lead for Olympic.

The game continued to be a lively affair and we were still managing to muster plenty of our own opportunities, particularly on the break early. Olympic's midfielders had broken up a few counter attacks early and an early booking was soon given to their central midfielder.

Another fast break from our team saw Luis Corrales win the race to a ball in behind their defence and place his header past the advancing Olympic Keeper to bring us back level 1-1.

It wasn't long after that we managed to get the ball in behind and after Jerram Tuck won the race to the ball he was clattered into by the oncoming Olympic goal keeper who had missed the ball completely. A penalty was awarded, and the goal keeper cautioned, but unfortunately for us, the penalty was not converted. We continued to pressure Olympic and we were starting to gain ascendancy in the game through moving the ball quickly. We soon won a second Penalty on the back of a great touch past his defender by Micky Malivuk who was then pulled back and bought down before striking at goal. This penalty was put away by Steve Guley to put us ahead 2-1.

Just before half time the earlier booked midfielder for Olympic found himself being dismissed for a second bookable offense after a rash challenge. Half Time 2-1 to us.

The second half began as we had talked about in the changing rooms, with Olympic coming out hard to get themselves back on level terms as quickly as possible. We saw off the early pressure well with Sam Pickering helping to break up Olympic attacks and our back 3 lead by Kade Schrijvers defending very well. We increased our lead to 3-1 with a fantastic goal by Micky Malivuk after some great quick combination passing on the edger of the Olympic area got Micky enough space to bend his shot past the keeper and into the far corner.

Olympic pulled a goal back quickly with a great strike from range that again caught everyone un-aware and nestled into the top corner of the net, 3-2 and game back on.

From here we managed to get back on top in the game and our dominance of Olympics 10 men lead to another penalty kick which was originally saved by the Olympic keeper who was adjudged

to have come forward off his line early. A retake was given, and the mandatory yellow card was issued to the goal keeper. After his earlier booking for his challenge on Jerram Tuck, the Olympic keeper was also sent off. Steve Guley converted the second attempt nicely and we lead 4-2.

# TEAM WELLINGTON

## TEAM WELLINGTON END AUCKLAND CITY'S OCEANIA REIGN, ADVANCE TO CHAMPIONS LEAGUE FINAL.

Team Wellington celebrate advancing to the OFC Champions League final at the expense of Auckland City. Team Wellington have ended Auckland City's seven-year reign as champions of Oceania.

They won the OFC Champions League semifinal between the two on away goals after drawing 2-2 on aggregate, and will now chase a maiden title – they had a 2-2 draw on Sunday in Auckland, following a 0-0 draw in the capital last week.

The visitors steadily built momentum throughout the first half at Kiwitea St before taking the lead in the 37th minute, when Eric Molloy thundered a far-post header past City keeper Enaut Zubikarai.

It was the first time City had conceded in 1405 minutes of play in all competitions, but it only took five minutes for them to concede another, as Angus Kilkolly converted from the penalty spot, following a collision in the box between City midfielder Cam Howieson and Wellington defender Roy Kayara.

Those goals proved enough in the end, as City could only find two in reply, when they needed three – though they certainly gave it a good try.

City coach Ramon Tribulietx opted to stick with the changed system he used last weekend, playing with three at the back in order to try to counter Team Wellington's high press, but more than anything, it seemed to leave his players uncertain of what to do, with their usual patterns of play not available - last week they played with two in midfield, and three up front, this week that was reversed.

Eric Molloy points the way after his headed goal gave Team Wellington the lead at Kiwitea St.

Teenage forward Callum McCowatt was one who found himself in an unfamiliar role, playing at right wingback, and it was no surprise that Molloy, Wellington's left wingback, became a prominent figure.

City looked strong in the opening 15 minutes, but after that, the rest of the first half was all Team



Wellington, who forced a pair of fine double saves from Zubikarai, in the 23rd and 30th minutes – both times it was Nati Hailemariam first, then Molloy second that the Spaniard denied.

Then came the goals, which, as they were the only ones scored on the road in the tie, meant a score draw would leave Team Wellington going through, ending the prospect of extra time or penalties.

Andy Bevin was the creator for Molloy's header, getting into the box down the right, and playing a perfectly-weighted ball to the back post, where the Irishman headed it into the far side of the net.

Tribulietx reshuffled his troops after the opener, moving back to the 4-3-3 system that has become synonymous with City during his reign.

Needing three second-half goals to advance to the final, and keep their hopes of an eighth Champions League title in a row alive, City came out strong, but every time they got a shot off, there seemed to be a Wellington body in the way.

In the 77th minute, City pulled one back, as an Emiliano Tade free kick took a deflection off Taylor

Schrijvers to leave Wellington keeper Scott Basalaj stranded.

They continued to push, and with two minutes of the eight originally added remaining, Wellington defender Scott Hilliar turned the ball into the back of his net, putting City one goal away.

That goal never came, however, and the match finally ended when Basalaj punched a corner clear, 11 minutes into added time.

Lautoka of Fiji beat Marist of the Solomon Islands 1-0 in Honiara later on Sunday, to win the other semifinal 2-1 on aggregate.

The winner of the two-legged final, set for the weekends of May 12 – in Wellington – and 19 – in Fiji, will book a place at the Club World Cup in December. If that turns out to be Team Wellington, it could represent a power shift in New Zealand football.

An increase in communication picked the team up during the second half, and also lead to a goal with an inch perfect Joel Tennent through ball being latched onto by Max Odgers to put Stop out ahead 2-1 as the game started to open up as tired legs began to take effect. 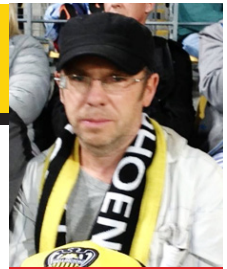
Somewhere in that, now, long ago time I thought about trying to finish up early and ignoring the what if. It turned out, in my experience, to be just as rewarding as staying out all night.
