Arriving to the ground today it was clear that there had been a lot of rain around and it was going to be a little more difficult to play in some areas of the pitch. We welcomed Miramar to Hutt Park today as they also hosted our reserve team at Dave Farrington Park in Capital 1.

We soon managed to work the ball down our right hand side and break, we played a ball into Luis who attracted 2 defenders to him before back heeling the ball on to an arriving and unmarked Steve Guley who finished past the Miramar Keeper to equalise 2-2. Within a couple of minutes we had got the ball back into the area to Luis who turned his man on the by-line, his marker decided to pull him back and another penalty was awarded. Luis again stepped up to finish and give us a 3-2 lead. Confidence grew and we were now pressuring Miramar into more and more mistakes. Luis was again causing Miramar problems as we won possession and played a pass to him where he poked the ball past the oncoming keeper and into the bottom corner of the net to complete his hatrick, 4-2.

Late in the game Jerram Tuck turned his marker on the edge of the area and placed a left footed strike past the goal keeper to cap the game off nicely for us and take the win with a final score of 5-2.

CENTENARY LOOMS

Next year it is one hundred years since the formation of Stop Out. That seemed to be, to me in any case, a long time ago. Well that was until the Sunday morning of the Champions League final between Real Madrid and Liverpool. My friends and I had gathered at the Temple of Football which is probably better know as Alastair's Place



At some stage during the match I looked up and realised that the faces looking back at me were not as young as they once were. We, those I was watching with, are all connected in one way or another because of Stop Out Sports Club. That connection though has been in place longer than I thought and in the longest case about fifty years. Half the life span of the club itself. Thinking back to the early 1970s the realisation struck me that some of the ' old grown ups' then at the club had been about since about day one in 1919. Names I have long since forgotten.

Looking back to those about me it struck me that whilst time might go by some of us have, what I will call, 'football character' that is embedded and which doesn't seem to change much. As the group rambled and ranted on through ninety minutes the distinct football characters came out. Some at odds with the owners every day character. Then again, some quite neatly aligned.

First up there is the recorded history character. This man only shocks us when he cannot answer a question about the game. The beauty of this knowledge is that internet access, or an encyclopaedia, is not needed during match time. Play, well watching it, is not interrupted.

Then there is expert character. This man has an opinion on every aspect of the game, Be that playing, coaching, reporting, broadcasting, pitch preparation, national character ad nauseam. Followed by real expert character. This is entirely different to expert character in that this depth of knowledge was earned by travelling to hundreds, millions of matches, across several continents absorbing much about him. Around the room was more expert than you might think character. This character gets it. He understands much about the game and the physicality of the contest. The trouble is that expert character is too busy giving us his opinion for the more incisive opinion to be given any floor time.

Near him was quiet character. This man was once a goalkeeper and brings a stoicism to events that is almost Zen like with just the occasional profanity that proves he is still breathing.

The exemplar though is expert character's wife. She has absorbed football wisdom by osmosis and stays aloof from the fray only entering to produce something profound. These comments usually prompt quiet self-examination from the rest of the group.

For this we have to thank those who, ninety nine years ago, started up a club to look after the youth of the time. They brought us together What would they make of it today?
