



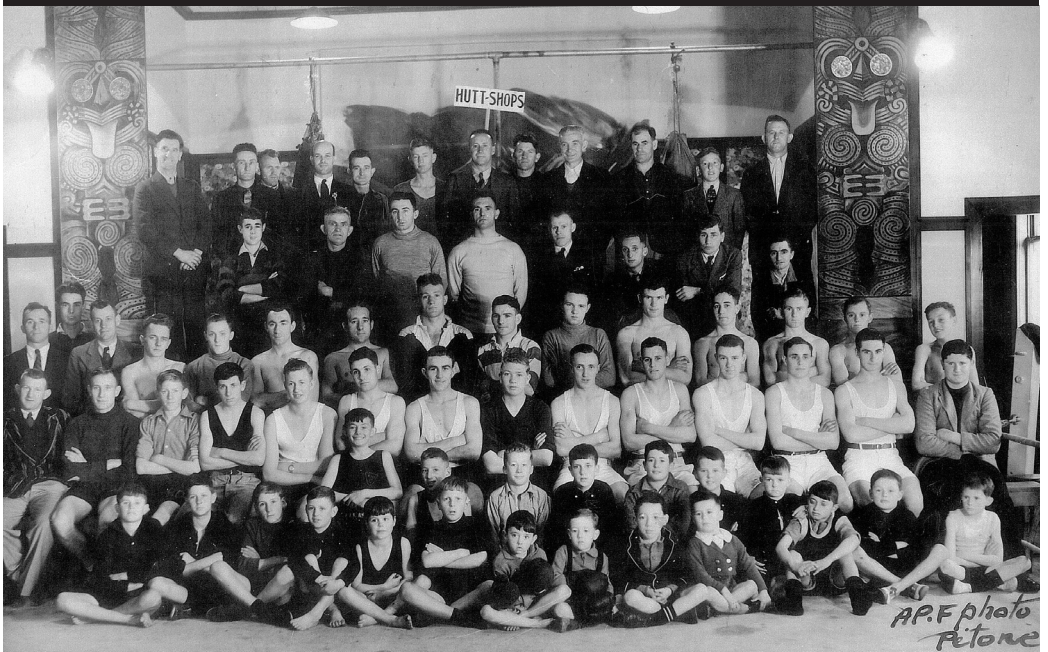

A tough fixture for us today against our neighbours and local rivals Lower Hutt. This is a team we have already played twice this season with our pre-season fixture and the first round considered. We know each other well and both prior fixtures have been tough close encounters that we have managed to come out on top of. We didn't expect much different today and that would prove to be the case.

We started well from the kick off today which we haven't always done this season. We were managing to get in behind Lower Hutt's back 4 and cause their centre back some issues. Our defenders were being quite direct and were having success so didn't go too far away from what was working. After a couple of tough chances where we had been snuffed out, we managed to get Mickey on the ball in the area > Mickey struck his shot firmly at goal and it was saved well by the Hutt keeper but only as a lively Luis Corrales who sharply buried the rebound with a great first time strike to put us 1-0 up.

On the back of the first goal we created a couple more chances on the break but couldn't get the final ball across or couldn't get the clinical finish. Lower Hutt created a couple of chances of their own, most notably Ryan Kelly going on a good run but couldn't find a finish. Half time came with us up 1-0.

The second half felt much like the first. Both teams were able to create opportunities but it was us who managed to get our striker Jerram Tuck in a good position 1v1 with a centre back. He took the ball down brilliantly with his first touch using his pec/shoulder area (definitely not a hand ball) and made his way past the centre back and placed his shot past the advancing goal keeper and into the bottom corner of the net for a 2-0 lead.

It felt as if we were well on top and heading towards a good win but with 20 minutes to go the referee awarded Lower Hutt a penalty after a hand ball in the box. The penalty was well converted and it was 2-1. Lower Hutt grew in confidence on the back of that and it made for an interesting and nervy last 20 minutes. Both teams made multiple substitutes to try and have their desired effect on the game and apart from a very good save from James McPeake at the feet of a Lower Hutt striker, we closed the game out well and were even a little wasteful in front of goal. The game finished 2-1 and we are happy to bank another 3 points.

A solid defensive performance was led by James McPeake and Kade Shrijvers again. James Sutcliffe distributed out from the back very well. Cherbel Khouchaba was excellent out wide and showed some fantastic touches. Luis Corrales was lively, caused problems and finished his goal well.

Jerram Tuck scored with another clinical finish. Our midfield of Sam Pickering, Steve Guley and Mickey Malivuk were dominant today. Man of the match went to Mickey Malivuk who was exceptionally accurate in possession, worked tirelessly and provided a constant threat.

Round 32 of the Chatham Cup provided us with an away fixture to a club that we have had some tough recent history with. This game was always going to prove a difficult task.

winning the race to the ball Steve was caught by a lunging tackle from the Marist Centre Back and bought down for a penalty. Steve stepped up, slotted the ball home and we took a 1-0 lead early in the second half.

We continued a good period of possession and had shut down any opportunities for Marist in the second half who seemed to be tiring. Frustratingly we failed to convert any of our created scoring opportunities but, on a positive note, we had managed to shut down any opportunities for Marist to equalise.

We held on to end the match with a 1-0 win and earned our place in the round of 16. Again, not one of our better performances but the result still came and the attitude and application of the players to work through the frustrating periods to get the result was fantastic.

Many thanks to Palmerston North Marist who were great hosts. The hospitality around the place was top notch, the ball kids looked great and the food was brilliant. We wish them all the best for the rest of their season.

We will return to the training pitch this week with plenty to work on. The management team will likely also have some very tough decisions to make if we manage to get Micky Malivuk, Luis Corrales, Sam Pickering and Lewis Jackson back into consideration for squads this week.

Stop Out vs Wairarapa - MASTERTON MEMORIAL TURF

A wee bit of a drive to today's game against Wairarapa. We all arrived to Masterton Memorial turf eager to get out there and look to reverse the first round result of this fixture.

As the whistle blew we began sharply. We were taking opportunities to play out and had Wairarapa under pressure at the back. Wairarapa were also carrying some good threat early with quick balls forward towards Hamish Watson and Paul Ifil who often tried to release the good pace they had out wide. Unfortunately with our good play in possession we were wasteful early in front of the goal and were struggling to make anything count. After breaking down our right hand side we won a corner after Cherbel had his attempted cross blocked. From the corner Luis bundled home a goal mouth scramble to put us up 1-0.

That lead didn't last that long as a few minutes later Hamish Watson managed to make his way past our defensive pressure and blast his shot past our goal keeper to equalise, 1-1. It looked

as though we would bounce back pretty quickly from that set back as we got back into some good play in possession. A few more good opportunities were created but again we were frustratingly poor with our finishing. Even though we were creating many opportunities to score, Wairarapa were continuing to pose their own goal scoring threats through their talent in the attacking areas.

We would be made to pay for those missed opportunities as Wairarapa managed to get a ball inside to an unmarked player outside the edge of the box who curled his shot across our goal keeper and into the far corner of the net for a 2-1 lead. That's the way it would stay through to half time.



We took the 5 minute trek back to our container changing room to re-group at half time. After a frustrating half it was important to head back out confident we could turn it around. I was confident the team could do that and felt our best today was in front of us.

The second half began sprightly for us again. We were straight back into mounting pressure and creating opportunities to score. Unfortunately we again were not clinical enough to take any chances and as was the case for the entire match, Wairarapa were continuing to hold their own threat going forward. All 3 substitutes were made in an attempt to throw some fresh legs and new problems at Wairarapa. Just as we were starting to fear our inability in front of goal would cost us any points, we managed to work the ball wide to second half substitute Jarred Mitchell. Jarred clipped a perfect ball into the box for another second half substitute Luke Grindlay to rise and header the ball past the goal keeper to earn us a stoppage time equaliser.

2–2 the game would finish and it ended up being tough for us to be upset with that as we ended up spending a large part of the game behind. While we were good for large parts in possession, we were miles away from where we want to be in the attacking 3rd of the field. After a frustrating outing that cost us some valuable ground at the top end of the table, I did not award a man of the match as the frustration continued to a rather poor effort of hosting a game day and after match.

We will back to the training ground this week in preparation for the cup game against Palmerston North Marist. We will be looking to select a side who show a good ability to work hard at areas we need to improve this week and look forward to the big cup fixture.

TWO TO THE POWER OF ONE

Stop Out vs Lower Hutt City - HUTT PARK

Since Stop Out won promotion back into the Central League in 2015, the result of their home game against Lower Hutt City has always been 2-1. In 2015 & 16 it was Lower Hutt that proved victorious, 2017 it was Stop Out and this year proved to be the same.

This was my first visit to Stop Out this season, although I had seen them hammer Wellington Olympic 7-2 at Wakefield Park. The last couple of seasons have seen Stop Out start well and be in or around the top of the table, then when the National League ended, they would usually get a couple of players from Team Wellington, and whether or not this was related, they would have a mid season collapse, before recovering but ultimately finishing around 4th or 5th in the table. That hasn't happened this season, the only player they got from Team Wellington was Justin Gulley, who was away in India with the All Whites anyway.

Going into this game Stop Out were riding high in second place with seven wins, one draw and only two losses. Looking at the playing squad there weren't too many changes from last season, a couple of returnees, Luis Corrales from Olympic, Sam Pickering and Paora Porter from Petone. They had lost Martin Packer to Capital Premier side North Wellington, but the most significant change had been in the coaching, Scott Easthope coming into replace Chris Sambrooke, who stepped down due to work commitments. Although these changed and Sambrooke is back as the assistant coach.

Lower Hutt City had a decent start to the season, but were well into a bad run having lost four in a row going into this game. The club continues to maintain it's focus on youth development and have a pretty reasonable record in recent years several players coming through and moving on to Team Wellington. Their big signing this season was Wellington Phoenix keeper, Keegan Smith (who is on a youth contract so can play in this league). Coach Steve Coleman has also taken on a role at the Phoenix Academy, which has been questioned by some as the Phoenix academy is in partnership with Wellington United in the same league.

But today was about a local derby, the 30th meeting of these clubs in the league and Chatham Cup since 1969 and despite Stop Out having won 14 of the previous encounters to Lower Hutt City's nine, (six draws), it is Lower Hutt who have scored more goals 47 to Stop Out's 41.

It took just eight minutes for Stop Out to work towards reducing that deficit, when Luis Corrales smashed in a rebounding shot for his seventh goal of the season and celebrated with a shout that

was likely to attract the geese from the nearby Hutt River, followed by a Usain Bolt pose! Brilliant stuff!

It looked a bit like the floodgates would open as Lower Hutt were struggling to deal with the speed of Corrales, but they managed to settle down and keep in relatively under control and defended quite well from their point of view. From a spectators point of view it wasn't a great watch and while there were a few clashes between players there wasn't anything really significant to note in the rest of the first half.

The second half continued much the same, Stop Out dominating the possession, but finding the Lower Hutt defence hard to break down, when they did manage it and Corrales had broken through and put the ball in the back of the net, they were called back for a free kick on the edge of the area. While it was a foul and referee, Robert Swinney, did blow the whistle just before Corrales hit his shot, it could be used as a classic example of when to allow advantage.

Nothing came of the free kick, but not long after Jerram Tuck, decided that he should keep up

with Corrales in the golden boot race and netted his seventh of the season. His celebration wasn't quite as ostentatious as Corrales', but spell check did change his name to Jerry's Tucker when it was tweeted out!

There were only about 10 minutes left and Stop Out were looking as if they'd ride it out, that was until Lower Hutt attacked and despite the danger being averted, one of their defenders handled the ball as it was heading out of the penalty area. Lower Hutt's Sam Johnson sent James McPeake the wrong way and it looked as if we'd have a tense last few minutes.....but we didn't and the most interesting thing to happen in that time was discussions about the speed of the referee's watch who seemed to want the game to just keep on going.

So for the fourth year in a row this game ended 2-1, this time to Stop Out, the result also put them top of the table, albeit for one night, as Napier City Rovers played Miramar Rangers on the Sunday and won 3-1.

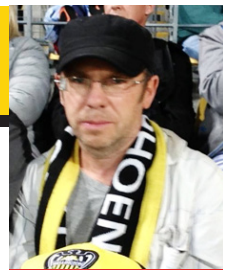

In the midst of the current World Cup buzz it has been hard to maintain the focus and keep things local. They may be due to the time difference with where the matches are being hosted. Some of us, probably the majority, are doing all sorts of watching hours then thinking about sleep...but ignoring that and setting off to keep the wheels of industry turning.

One thing a World Cup does is bring out the stereotype and, perhaps, the cliché. Whilst thinking about that issue, stereotype, I started to remember an angry man, in a Wellington pub, many years ago. I was about nineteen in, now long gone, The Shamrock at the top of Molesworth Street. The conversation was not so much about football as me explaining to some, less than fit, colleagues why I played. In the midst of our chat an angry man arrived. He started shouting at me, and then my colleagues, telling us that Stop Out was a 'terrible club built around a deserved reputation for dirty play'. Clearly I have sanitised his comments for this audience.

His comments bothered me for a two reasons. Firstly, they were not true. Contesting the game in hard, skilled and fair manner, that had been my experience of the Stop Out that far. The older coaches that I had been lucky enough to offer tutelage had all be of the hard but fair mould. Secondly, a room full of people had heard without any context the comments made. At first I wasn't overly bothered until I overheard a discussion in the work lunch room. A voice was expressing the view that it was a shame that a 'nice boy', that was me, should be involved in a club with such a 'bad attitude'. It was crazy. In that, an angry man with a bad attitude had shouted loudly in a pub, in front of some people, who barely knew me, and suddenly his view had currency and was worth quoting. With hindsight, I guess, it could be

considered a good life lesson. Put simple, life is not always fair. At the same time what to make of people, about you, who will take on board a stranger's point of view without testing it as, somehow, fact. Stereotypes and clichés are often like this. If they get used loudly, and often, they sometimes get to be accepted currency.

As it happens I bumped into angry man about five years later. Quite randomly I ended up playing against him. He had, in contemporary parlance, 'issues'. The polite description would be to say his playing style was a mix of bullying and dirty. Angry man badly fouled a player and as he jogged away his own coach stalked on to the pitch. Reaching him the coach pointed towards the dressing rooms and said to him 'just go'. He did.
