BACK IN THE DAY, IT WAS "PLAY ON!" TODAY? PROBABLY 6 WEEKS.



OVER-RATED

Over the last few weeks as the Fifa World Cup® has gone on the term 'over-rated' has been thrown about. Usually I ignore the term but when I overheard some 'young fellas' talking about Men's Central League I heard then describe two players of prominence as 'over-rated'. They must be prominent as they do not play for Stop Out yet I have heard of them. Not able to help myself I asked then 'who over-rates them?".

Honestly, they then stared at me as if I was odd. I thought it a fair question and deserving of a fair answer. No answer was forthcoming. In fact they rather rudely, I thought, indicated I should 'go away'.

The following morning whilst watching a FIFA World Cup® match I again heard the term overrated being used. The same thought to came to mind. Over-rated by whom or what exactly? The television agria must have got the rating from somewhere. (Agria? Wait for it. An agria is a common potato. A common tater if you like. Geddit?) Immediately I got home I did a series of searches on the Internet. I finally found some ratings agencies. Without hesitation I called one of them. On my call being answered I simply asked for the ratings desk and was put through. This was a mistake. It seems that Standard & Poor's

rate banks, financial institutions and financial instruments...and not footballers. The helpful but slightly dismissive voice at the other end of the call suggested that Football's governing body, FIFA, might be better positioned to deal with my call.

Everyone knows that FIFA do 'rankings' and not 'ratings' but I called in any case. The reply was go tour website. I did and was disappointed. The site, as I knew, ranks not rates and it's national teams only. "The basic logic of these calculations is simple: any team that does well in world football wins points which enable it to climb the world ranking. A team's total number of points over a four-year period is determined by adding the average number of points gained from matches during the past 12 months and the average number of points gained from matches older than 12 months (depreciates yearly) ".

This left me at square one. How can we know if a team or a player is over-rated if there is no ratings system in place? It seems that the answer is that there is no formal rating system in place. I was pointed to the Urban Dictionary where I read this clunky definition "A term used to describe something, or someone, that gets more hype and credit than actually worth. It is due to personal opinion and anyone who hates anything that's well known, No matter how brilliant something is, if it gets a lot of media attention then there's always someone who will think it's overrated." More fool me. In short, it seems that ANY player can be over-rated if someone simply says they are.
